1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Looking back on the pre-accreditation condition of academics, infrastructure and administrative set up of our college, the positive change is unmistakable.

Janata Shikshan Mandal's Smt. Indirabai G. Kulkarni Arts College, J. B. Sawant Science College and Sau. Janakibai D. Kunte Commerce College, popularly known as JSM College, was established in the year 1961. The college is a reputed educational institution, which has been known for producing outstanding students who take on different careers, as per their academic merit and performance in extra and co-curricular activities successfully in the society. Mumbai University has awarded 'Best College Award to the college in 2019. The college is affiliated to University of Mumbai. It offers UG, PG and Research Programmes. It is Grant-in-Aid college and recognized by UGC under section 2 (f) and 12 B. The college is multifaculty and co-education institute.

Location of the Institution: The College is situated on sea shore of Alibag - Raigad (Maharashtra). The college has campus area of 5 acres. It is conveniently accessible to the stakeholders by road and walk. Geographical location of the college is with latitude 18002'38.3'' N and longitude 73000'51.7'' E.

Our college is the pioneering senior college in Raigad district, beginning with the dynamic leadership of Adv. Datta Patil. The college was established in June 1961 to provide quality higher education to the children of farmers, workers, fishermen and saltpan workers of Raigad District, especially of Alibag, Pen, and Murud tehsils. Our college was the sole option at the time of its establishment that provided educational platform to the aforesaid populace. Presently Adv. Gautam Patil is shouldering the responsibility as a chairman and received Bharat Gaurav Award for the best Educationist-2023 for his contribution towards Health, education, and Economical development. During academic year 2022-23 College received Education Excellence award. College received Best NSS unit, Best NSS program officer and Best NSS volunteer award during academic year 2019-20 by University of Mumbai. The college has legacy of cultural prizes and won Zonal General Championship for successive four years.

The College was accredited (Cycle 3rd) with 'B' Grade by NAAC, Bangalore in 2018 March with CGPA of 2.08.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The College offers 13 Under-Graduate Programmes, 05 Post-Graduate Programmes, 02 Research Programmes and 20 Career Oriented / Skill Based Certificate and 05 Diploma Courses at UG and PG in Arts, Science and Commerce faculty. In all 565 courses/papers are offered by the college across UG and PG level programmes. Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) is implemented at UG and PG level programmes as per the guidelines of UGC and University of Mumbai. The Programmes are run to achieve stated Vision, Mission and Objectives of the college as per the values propounded by the parent institution. The college has introduced following new programmes/courses during last five years: 25 Certificate, Diploma and Career Oriented/Skill Based Courses (2018-19) Foundation Course in NCC for F.Y. and S.Y. NCC Cadets. (2021-22) Master of Commerce (Accountancy) (2023-24). The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal evaluation. 25 Certificate/Diploma/Career Oriented/Skill Based courses were offered during the last five years. 2111 students were enrolled in Certificate/Diploma/Career Oriented/Skill Based courses during the last five years. 22.15% students enrolled in Certificate/ Add-on/Value added programs as against the total number of students during the last five years. The college integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum of UG and PG Programmes. 1354 students undertook project work/field work /internships in the latest completed academic year 2022-23. Percentage of students undertaking project work/field work/ internships in the year was 72.6. Curriculum of traditional UG and PG level programmes is designed by University of Mumbai with stated Programme and Course Outcomes. The academic departments of the college have prepared Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes as per the curriculum of respective domain subject. Curriculum of institutional 25 Certificate, Diploma and Career

Oriented/Skill Based Courses is designed by the faculty. The college obtained feedback on the academic performance and ambience of the institution from various stakeholders, such as Students, Teachers, Employers and Alumni and action taken report on the feedback is made available on institutional website.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Our College has registered consistent growth in the percentage of girl students' admissions during last five years due to safe environment. The college strictly follows reservation policy for admissions of students laid down by the State Govt. of Maharashtra. We have a distinct advantage of more than 50% of students admitted from the reserved category for all the five years.

2. In order to enhance learning experience of students, our strategy is not to teach but help students to learn on their own. We adopt flexible strategy to address the needs of students belonging to all intellectual levels. The focus is on development of skills and enhancement of problem solving aptitude.

3. The faculty members of college have adopted and implemented various teaching methods to make learning more student-centric. The various experiential learning methods, participative learning method, problems solving method are adopted by faculty members to make the teaching-learning process more students centric and enhance learning experiences. We have registered sizable growth in number of teachers using ICT. As students of present era are highly techno savvy, Use of ICT in teaching and learning is a boon to generate interest and ease of comprehension in the area of study.

4. We have filled 89.58% of sanctioned teaching posts which is a remarkable figure. 52.2% of them have acquired higher qualification like NET/SET/SLET and Ph.D.

5. Student – Full time Teacher Ratio during the latest completed academic year was 28.69: 01.

6. Pass percentage of Students during last five years is 81.3 which is much higher than results of affiliating University.

7. The IQAC of the college has institutionalized Student Satisfaction Survey to avail feedback on teaching, learning and evaluation process and measure satisfaction level of the students. The IQAC conducted Student Satisfaction Survey during the assessment period and took corrective measures for quality improvement and its sustenance.

8. The university has all along experimented with patterns of continuous evaluation. We have followed the prescribed systems rigorously which variously include theory examinations, practical, projects, assignments, viva and unit tests.

Research, Innovations and Extension

- The college has received grant of Rs. 2.72 Lakhs from Government and non-governmental agencies for research projects/endowments in the institution during the last five years.
- The college has created an ecosystem for innovations and taken initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge.
- The College has 02 recognized research centers for Ph.D. in the subjects Botany and Hindi.
- There is separate research lab in the college for M.Sc. in Botany by Research recognized by University of Mumbai.
- The college has made provision of Seed Money of Rs.50000 per year for research
- 64 workshops/seminars/conferences/webinars were conducted during the last five years.
- The faculty members published in all 111 research papers during the last five years.
- 27 books and chapters in edited volumes/books and papers in national/ international conference proceedings were published during last five years.
- 109 extension and outreach activities were carried out in the neighborhood community sensitizing students to social issues for their holistic development by Academic departments and support services like NSS, NCC and WDC (Kindly refer 3.4.1)
- 24 awards/recognitions have been accorded by government/ government recognized bodies to the college and faculty for extension activities during last five years. (Kindly refer 3.4.2)
- 26 MoUs and 82 collaborations/linkages for Faculty exchange, Student exchange, Internship, Field trip, on-the- job training, research and other academic activities were fostered by the college during the last five years.
- The college has 07 recognized research guides for Ph.D. 11 research students are doing their Ph.D. Dr. Preeti Phate has published patent.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

1. Our planning for development of infrastructure in terms of classrooms and labs has been adequately fulfilled. The college has land of 5 Acres with built up area of 8891.05 sq. mts we have 37 classrooms out of which 12 classrooms with LCD projectors and 1 smart classroom. Similarly we have 19 laboratories used in two schedules to engage science practical.

2. We have provided each department with enough computers with internet connectivity. We have reasonable number of classrooms with ICT facility that is total 13 classrooms (35.13 %).

3. The college has provision of 100 MBPS Bandwidth.

4. There are 123 desktop computers, 16 Laptops, 11 LCD Projectors, 2 smart TV and LMS software to meet the requirement of ICT facility.

5. We have allocated 24.06% of the budget for infrastructure development. The college has spent Rs. 10651456 for infrastructure development in last five years.

6. Our library having carpet area above 5103.5 sq.ft. is in possession of over 64000 books and subscribes to 71 print periodicals and 29 academic journals ,42 magazines and 32 daily newspapers. library has subscriptions to 2 lac E-books,6000 E- journals and 8000 E-magazines. The library uses SOUL 2.0 software for integrated library management. Library books can be searched 24x7 by using web OPAC facility.

7. Our proud possession is rare books and manuscripts which are 140 in number. Over the years, we have provided internet access to student and staff free of cost at five different points and free Wi-Fi at 13 locations.

8. The college has developed 01 smart classrooms and CAP Centre.

9.The college has separate Administrative Office, Main Building, Library Building, IQAC, Sports Complex and physical infrastructure for Support Services.

10. The college has its institutional website www.jsmalibag.edu.in and developed a separate webpage for central library.

11. The college has Open Auditorium having capacity of 200 students.

12. The college has spent amount of Rs. 1347076/- on purchase of books, journals and subscription of online resources during last five years.

Student Support and Progression

The college strongly believes that students are the pivotal stakeholder of education system. It strives sincerely to attain overall development of all the enrolled students by strengthening support mechanism and attain their progression in term of academic results, achievements and active participation in co-curricular and curricular activities. The college has availed government and -- non-government scholarships to the eligible students. 4882 students have received govt. scholarships and ANGC Scholarship during last five years. Percentage of students benefited by scholarships and free ships provided by the Government and Non-Government agencies during last five years are 51.23%. Capacity building and skills enhancement initiatives taken by the college include Soft skills development through short term courses like Communication Skills in English, Certificate and Diploma Courses in English Speaking, Tata Strive Skill Development Programme and Mahindra Pride Skill Development Programme. There is separate provision of English Language Lab, Marathi & Hindi Language Lab facilities for development of language and communication skills. Organization of Yoga training programmes, provision of, provision of Health Centre, organization of free health checkup camps and provision of vending machines in ladies rooms are the major initiatives taken by the college for the health and hygiene of enrolled students. ICT/Computing skills are inculcated among students by providing required training and ICT facility. The college has made provision of 139 computers with 100 MPBS bandwidth connectivity to strengthen ICT/Computing Skills of the students. 10276 students have availed benefits of soft skills training programmes, language lab facility, computing skill development programmes and life skills oriented activities. 2150 students benefitted by guidance for competitive examinations and career counseling offered by the Institution. The Institution has a transparent mechanism for timely redressal of student grievances including sexual harassment and ragging cases. 211 students were placed through campus and off campus placement

drives during the assessment period. 903 students were progressed to higher education. Percentage of placement of outgoing students and students progressing to higher education during the last five years is 31.48. 49 students qualified in state/national/ international level examinations. 126 awards/medals have achieved by the students for outstanding performance in sports/ cultural activities at university / state/ national / international level. The students participated in 19 sports and cultural programs organized by the college and other institutes during the assessment period. Per year average of the same is 3.8. The College has proactive Alumni Association registered in July 2009. Registration No is MH /32267/2019/Raigad Dated 15/11/2019. Alumni of the college have donated Rs. 122600/- for development of the college during the assessment period.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The governance and leadership is in accordance with vision and mission of the institution and it is visible in various institutional practices such as decentralization and participation in the institutional governance. There is an admirable coordination between the management, college development committee, Principal and staff of the college which implements quality related policies and plans effectively for quality improvement and its sustenance. The Governing Body decentralizes the administration as per the constitution for the betterment of the institution by appointing management representative on College Development Committee.

The Perspective Plan of the Institute is prepared with the quality indicators of NAAC and in consultation with the Janata Shikshan Mandal management, CDC, IQAC, Administrative staff, faculty, alumni and student representatives. The college promotes decentralization and participative management through involvement of all its stakeholders. The Principal, Vice Principal, IQAC Co-ordinator, HODs, Registrar, Office Superintendent and support staff look after academic and administrative leadership of the college.

The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient. The college follows the policies framed by UGC, State Government of Maharashtra, University of Mumbai, NAAC and the Parent Institution. The college implements e-governance in areas of operation such as Administration, Finance and Accounts, Student Admission and Support and Examination. The parent institute and the college have effective welfare measures and Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff. Percentage of teachers provided with financial support to attend conferences/workshops and towards membership fee of professional bodies during the last five years is 15.41. Percentage of teaching and non-teaching staff participating in Faculty development Programmes, professional development/administrative training programs during the last five years is 13.16.

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources and it conducts internal and external financial audits regularly. Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes. It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities. Quality assurance initiatives of the institution include regular meeting of Internal Quality Assurance Cell, collection of Feedback from stakeholders, analysis of the feedback collected and use of the suggestions for improvements, take collaborative quality initiatives with other institution(s)/membership of international networks, Participation in NIRF and conduct of quality audit by recognized state, or national agencies such as NAAC.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

contexts and also how it is a part of larger education system in the Country. In this context institute choose “Environment Conservation” and “Electoral awareness” as best practices. College has encouraged the students to participate in various activities. In our college majority of the students belongs to Backward, other backward class. To get benefits of scholarship, freeship and other facilities to the students, college has appointed a committee to inform various schemes of state Government, Central Government and other private organizations to the students and monitor the process.

Being socially responsible and proactive in development, college organized various activities like tree plantation. Cleanliness drive, Punit sagar Abhiyan, Swatcha Bharat Abhiyan, Blood donation, Face mask distribution, Donation to flood affected people, Old age home visit etc.

We believe in giving holistic all round education to the students and sensitize them on our constitutional rights, Values, duties and responsibilities. In this regard college celebrates Independence Day, Republic Day, Constitution Day, Voters Day as well as college organized rallies like Anti-plastic, Anti-Drug etc.

Institute takes care of health of staff members by organizing health checkup camp, eye checkup camp, tobacco pledge etc.

<p>1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:</p>	<p>The NEP2020 aims at multidisciplinary, holistic and integrated learning. It also focuses on equitable and inclusive education. Our college commits itself to these goals by planning and implementing our academic calendar accordingly. Salience is given to all round personality development of students. Pedagogic education is the corner stone of the project of personality development of the student. We provide academic programs which build the foundational knowledge of the natural, social, technological ecosystem in the students. Our programs aim to build their intellectual understanding of the languages, social sciences, material science, commercial environment and technology in separate</p>
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streams as well as through multidisciplinary course options. Besides, we organize talks, webinars and training programs in fields like post-covid psychological challenges, Analytical method validation, Effects of affairs, PCOD in girl students, Gender awareness, entrepreneurship, intellectual property rights, Cyber Crimes awareness and many more to broaden their world view. We encourage and guide students to participate in multiple curricular and extracurricular activities like science project competitions Avishkar, Debate and elocution, games, Poster making competitions etc. Capacity building programmes for career choices are conducted regularly. Our management and faculty are not content with imparting only the pedagogic knowledge. We give equal importance to prepare them for career choices. To that end, we have introduced 05 career oriented courses. We have organized 05 workshops on interview skills, talks on Method validation in pharma industries, E-commerce sector, Intercollegiate Chess competition, Zonal Youth festival, Career opportunities in Insurance sector, startup rally etc. We have successfully held 01 placement camp in this remote and underdeveloped town in which 15 students were shortlisted by Reliance JIO. Ideological commitment of our management to social equity inclusiveness and democratic values is strong and consistent. Our college has always had a reputation for predominance of females, lower middle class and backward class students in our enrolment and merit lists. 75% of our students are eligible for government scholarships based on social justice. Teaching, non-teaching staff and students have always been vocal and constructive contributors in our statutory and non-statutory bodies. Regular and Robust Parent management and parent teacher is a hallmark of our conducts of affairs. A mofussil college like ours has a rare distinction of having four teachers placed in the professor grade. Affiliating University has also introduced skill based syllabi of core papers like communication skills in English & Business Communication at UG level & Skill Enhancement Course at PG level. The contents of courses are designed as per the guidelines of UGC & National Skill Qualification Framework.</p>
3. Skill development:	<p>Skill development programs aim to acknowledge the ability of the youth and extend their support by serving them with proper guidance, infrastructure, opportunities and encouragement that help to achieve their ambitions. The college strives for synergy with industries to provide platforms to develop their skills. The college encourages students to take benefit of industries and enriched themselves by combining classroom centered formal education with quality vocational education coupled with experience sharing</p>

with industrial practitioners. As per National Educational Policy guidelines, college had started new interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary courses like digital marketing, direct and indirect taxes, diploma in medical laboratory technology and MLT etc. The college has signed MoUs with nearby industries and organizations of national repute to inculcate entrepreneurship among students and also try to educate students of rural area. 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The College has well-structured examination committee formed as per the ordinances of the University of Mumbai. The committee strictly follows the University notifications, circulars and schedules for conducts of internal assessment. Continuous internal assessment is done through Unit Tests, Assignments Submission, Field Visit / Field Work, Seminars presentations and project. Unit tests are conducted regularly as per the schedule given in academic calendar. Regarding examination, for final year students of the institute conducts exams as per the university guidelines. For classes of UG, the college conducts the examination. The exams were conducted by the college under the supervision of Principal of the college and other members of examination committee. The Final years examination are conducted as per University guidelines. The results were declared within the stipulated time as prescribed by University of Mumbai. The college has Examinations section having CAP centre and CCTV surveillance to avoid malpractices during examinations. The assessment and moderation of answer papers is completed strictly as per the norms of university. The college has a separate CAP room with password protected computer and reprographic machine used for printing of questions papers under the supervision of administrative staff appointed by the Principal. Mastersoft software is used for preparation of results, printing of

marksheets and declaration of results.

Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time- bound and efficient. The college has a well-established mechanism and well framed policy for redressal of examination related grievances. College Examination Committee and Unfair Means Committee of the college act together to redress the examination related grievances. A. Grievances related to college conducted examinations: After the declaration of results, examination committee notifies the students to register their grievances within fifteen days. After verification of grievances, the redressal process is started immediately and completed within one or two weeks. Grievances related to corrections of results are solved by the examination committee immediately. Proof reading of the question papers is done by the paper setters to avoid typographical errors for smooth conduction of the examinations. As per the norms of the university, if any student is not satisfied by the marks obtained in respective papers can apply for the photocopy of the answer booklet. General grievances like discrepancies in name of student, course, course code, seat number printed on admission and examination forms are resolved in due time through examination committee. B. Grievances regarding university examinations: The entire mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is time bound as per University of Mumbai rule and regulations. Grievances related to undergraduate and post graduate courses are forwarded to the University Grievances Committee. Students can obtain photocopy of the answer sheets from university on request if needed. Students who were not satisfied with their marks at the University examinations can apply for revaluation/ reassessment to the University.

The attainment is calculated by summing up the scores of students and dividing the total by the number of students who appeared for the course. The evaluation of attainment of POs of the department is done from the pass percentage of the students in the final semester end university examination of the programme.

INFORMAL MECHANISM (INDIRECT METHOD): Attainment of POs and COs are also evaluated by indirect methods like active participation of the students in different curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities. Response:

The college has a land of 5 Acres and built up area of 8891.05 sq. meters. There is an adequate physical infrastructure in terms of classrooms, laboratories, and library and computer labs to cater to the academic needs of all the students. There are 37 classrooms out of which all are equipped with Wi-Fi facility, 12 classrooms with LCD projectors and 01 Smart Classrooms with LMS software that are used for ICT enabled teaching learning process,. The college has an Auditorium with seating capacity of 175 for organization of functions, meetings, seminars and conferences. The college has separate three storied administrative building which includes administrative office, CAP center, IQAC and Video Lecture Recording Centre. The college has in all 19 well equipped laboratories for academic departments. Laboratories of Department of Chemistry and Zoology are recognized for Research Programme. Computer Lab of Information Technology is equipped with 65 computers and high speed 100 Mbps internet connectivity. In all there are total 139 computers and 18 laptops in use. The computers available for students lead to student-computer ratio of 14:1. Each academic department is provided with computers for the use of students. The institute has a separate central library building having total carpet area 5103.5 sq. ft. (Ground + 2 Floor) equipped with 64000 books. In addition, academic departments have provision of departmental library facility. There is 01 Girl's Hostel to accommodate 20 students, Botanical Garden, Medicinal Plant Garden Canteen facility, HOD Cabins, NCC office, NSS office, Examination Section, Reprographic Centre, Video Lecture Recording Centre, Common staff rooms, Separate Girls and Boys common rooms, separate Parking facility for staff and students, Vermi-compost Unit, and Bio-gas Plants.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

Response:

Libraries are the backbone of any civilized society and heart of any academic institution. Thus the library at JSM College also acquires a prominent place among the students and faculty. The library of JSM College is one of the oldest and largest academic libraries in the Raigad district of Maharashtra. The

College library is functioning from 1961 since the inception of the college.

With a legacy that is close to 60 years, this library is spread across three floors in a separate building having a carpet area of 5103.5 sq. ft.

Ground Floor: Reading Hall having Capacity of 80, Book Issue and Return Counters, Periodical and Newspaper Section, Textbook Section, OPAC System.

First Floor: Acquisition Section, Book Stack Section, Staff reading area, Reprography facility.

Second Floor: Book Bank Section, Reference book Stack Section, Digital library facilities, Educational video development centre.

The library has a separate building with a collection of over 64000 books automated using SOUL 2.0 Integrated Library Management System (ILMS) developed by INFLIBNET, Ahmedabad. The college library uses SOUL 2.0 for all its housekeeping operations on daily basis. Library books can be searched 24×7 by using the Web OPAC facility. The library uses barcode technology to save the time of reader.

The library subscribes 71 print periodicals including 29 Academic Journals and 42 magazines. 32 Daily Newspapers are also subscribed. The college has spent the amount of Rs. 13,47,076/- on the purchase of books, journals, and newspapers during the last five years. The library has subscriptions to 2 lakh E-Books, 6000 E-Journals, and 8000 E-Magazines. Digital resources can be accessed remotely using digital platforms like library websites and mobile applications.

The library has a book bank facility for economically weaker students. Large number of students every year enjoys the facility of book bank. Students from SC/ST/DT/NT category avails the facility of Mumbai University Book Bank scheme where students can borrow books free of cost for the whole semester.

Library facilities are available for the faculty and students from 7:30 a.m. To 5:30 p.m. on working days. The students and faculty visits library for reading, referencing, lending books, accessing OPAC, E-resources. Average number per day usage of the library is 94.

- The college places great emphasis on providing modern IT facilities throughout its campus. This includes fully equipped classrooms, offices, library, computer labs, and seminar halls. The campus also features Wi-Fi connectivity, with regular updates and upgrades to maintain its modern technological infrastructure.
- To make the students computer friendly 121 computers and 18 laptops are used in the college for study teaching process. These computers are upgraded with required operating system and configuration as per requirement.
- The operating system used initially was Windows 7 and is upgraded with Windows 10 for better administrative work as per current scenario.
- The college has also implemented a variety of digital solutions to enhance its administrative processes, such as Master soft cloud and Techno Vision software for student attendance, a biometric machine for staff attendance, and the use of online software for admission, fees collection and exam management.
- The Central Library of the college has developed a separate LMS system for accessing e-resources. This system is available on the website <https://www.jsmalibag.edu.in> The library utilizes an Integrated Library Management Software, upgraded regularly, with barcoding of documents and books. Memberships are issued to students, allowing access to electronic resources at their convenience.
- As a safety measure, CCTV surveillance is installed throughout the college premises, with regular upgrades to cameras, DVRs, and displays. The college also maintains an updated profile online, with enrolment and scholarship management done through the use of MKCL software, while personnel and payroll management are managed through e-sevaarth pranali and E-TDS return filing.
- College profile is updated online on AISHE and MIS Portal etc. every year. Overall, the college is dedicated to providing the latest IT facilities to ensure the best educational experience for its students.
- The LMS used in the library has been using soul 2.0 provided from Inlibnet Ahamadabad which is multiplatform, multilingual, student-centric server based software for library housekeeping operation.
- The circumstantial dynamic website <https://www.jsmalibag.edu.in> operated by the IT department of the college has been upgraded to time to time. This website is maintained and updated with frequently as per changes.
- In order to provide good quality about 100 MBPS internet speed to the students in the college premises, the college has developed Wi-Fi facility in the campus with the help of 26 TP-Link Archer C20 dual band Wi-Fi routers.
- The college has developed video lecture recording center for students and 01 smart classrooms for ICT enabled teaching-learning process for students to benefit from information technology based education system.
- To ensure that learning is not limited to students, the college has started an institutional YouTube channel for uploading educational video lectures created by faculty for the benefit of students and teachers have their own YouTube channels.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from

various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

The institute has a mechanism for internal and external audits. We have our own internal audit mechanism where internal audit is an ongoing continuous process in addition to the external auditors to verify and certify the entire Income and Expenditure and the Capital Expenditure of the Institute each year. Qualified Internal have been permanently appointed and a team of staff under them does a thorough check and verification in each financial year. Likewise, an external audit is also carried out on an elaborate way on a yearly basis. The institutional accounts are audited regularly by both Internal and statutory audits. So far there have been no major findings/objections. Minor errors or omissions and commissions when pointed out by the audit team are immediately corrected /rectified and precautionary steps are taken to avoid recurrence of such errors in the future. The institute regularly follows an internal-external financial audit system.

Institutional strategies for mobilization of funds and the optimal utilization of resources

The college receives salary grant from Government of Maharashtra for permanent employees. . Donations received from stakeholders. The college has received donation of Rs. 7,16700/- during the assessment period. Proposals are submitted to different funding agencies like UGC, DST and University to receive grants. The college has received grant of Rs. 272000. The college is self-assured to grow and make its mark in global scenario by providing requisite funds and optimal use of resources. Since it is Grand-in add college, the main sources of funds are student fees and Grant in aid from State Government as per budgetary allocations.

However, for meeting the upcoming requirements for teaching learning resources and teaching, the college also mobilizes its resources through:

1. Grant under section 12 B of UGC
2. Funded projects from UGC and Mumbai University
3. Fees collected by conduct of conferences, workshops etc.
4. Leasing out the infrastructure facilities to various commercial utility facilities for Government and local governing bodies
5. The college also mobilizes its resources from funds generated from self-financing courses run by the college, non-government bodies and individuals.
6. The budget is prepared as per the developmental criteria of the institution; accordingly, provisions are made in the budget, which is prepared by a team of experts under supervision of college development Committee before the fund is sanctioned.

Funds are utilized:

1. for effective teaching-learning practices

2. for the development and maintenance of infrastructure.
3. For Enhancement of library facilities needs to augment learning practices.
4. for social service activities as part of social responsibilities through NSS and NCC.

Internal Complaint Committee is constituted as per the regulations of Maharashtra Government 2013 Act for prevention and prohibition of sexual harassment if any. Above committees helps us in maintaining the discipline and providing the security of girl students.

Following initiatives are taken to ensure safety and security of girl students.

- The college campus is under CCTV surveillance.
- Suggestion boxes are installed to drop suggestion or complaints from students regarding safety and security. The complaints are immediately resolved by the Grievance Redressal Cell.
- The discipline committee of the college safe guards the campus in all aspects. In college campus the Identity Card is compulsory for students and staff. During the seven days NSS residential camp security and safety is provided by allotting special duties to female faculty. One of the female staff is appointed as NSS programme officer.
- During mega events like cultural, sports Day and Annual day when most of the students are present on the campus, the Discipline committee students' council and NSS, NCC volunteers together maintain the safety and security.
- College has security system which consist of two males and one security guards present on the campus.

- The training in self-defence camp, lectures on sexual harassment at work place, self-employment camp organized for girl students.

Best Practice-2

The destruction of environment and the eradication of wild life, air pollution, water pollution, garbage and pollution of the natural environment are all challenges for India.

Water resources are indispensable for life; their quantity is limited at many regions of the planet. Present serious problems of scarcity and water stress.

Waste generated in the offices is not dangerous but waste generated in chemistry laboratory is hazardous for community.

Air pollution is the first environmental cause of death. Urban air pollution is a serious problem in many cities, and road transportation is major cause of pollution.

Practice: To reduce consumption of Electricity

- Replace traditional tube lights by LED bulbs and tube lights at some places.
- Installed one solar unit.

- Immediately solve possible leaks and water leaks in taps.
- Rain water harvesting

Waste Management

- Degradable waste collected and converts it into compost. College has compost pit of size 10' x 10'. College used compost for the trees planted on the college campus.
- Non degradable waste collected and handover to Alibag Municipal Council for the further processing.
- Wastes collected from Chemistry laboratory can't be drained directly as it is hazardous for society. Therefore acid waste and base waste get neutralized by following proper process and then drained out.
- College promotes a system of internal communication between employers, making use of new technologies to reduce use of paper.
- "No use of plastic" posters are displayed at various places on college campus.

Air Pollution

- Most of the college students belong to rural area, so they travel by public state transport services to reach college.
- Students participated actively in tree plantation, Swacchta Abhiyan organized by Alibag Municipal Council.
- College celebrated "No vehicle Day" on college campus.

Evidence of Success:

- College decided to use alternate source of energy such as solar energy as well as to reduce the consumption of electricity by replacing traditional tube lights by LED bulbs and tubes at some places. This action of college reduces the electricity bill.
- Distilled water is a necessary thing for practical especially for the subject of chemistry. Our college implemented rain water harvesting and fulfilled the need of distilled water.
- Due to industrialization and urbanization the air becomes polluted through various activities like tree plantation, Swachhata Abhiyan etc. students participated in these activities actively.
- Day by day use of bicycles, e-vehicles and CNG vehicles has increased.

Problems encountered and resources required:

- To replace all the traditional tubes by LED bulbs and tube lights at a time not possible due to financial limitation.
- Now days we are facing non-degradable waste and e-waste problem. To overcome this problem we handover the e-waste to private agency for processing

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1

Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

Our college is situated on sea shore which gives sense to preserve the ecological balance as well as the enthusiasm of students and premises due to natural scenery.

As per vision and mission statement, “Arise Awake and Move to Achieve Goal”, Institute has been focusing on uplifting of students. The distinctive area of the institute is “Socio-economic upliftment of Reserved Category students and female students through Quality Education.

The college was established in June 1961 with the aim to educate students of farmers, workers, and fisherman and saltpan workers of Raigad District, especially of Alibag and Murud Tehsil. Our college was the sole option made available for higher educational opportunities to the children of aforesaid populace at the time of its establishment. It has successfully been marching ahead and taking efforts endlessly for the betterment of the socio economically backward section of our society. The institute has been playing a pivotal role in the development of such students through the means of education. Majority of students enrollment in college belong to economically and socially backward section of society. Majority of the students coming from nearby villages of rural area, unable to pay their fees in one installment. College provides them the facility to pay the fees in two or three installments as per their convenience. As well as to get benefits of various schemes of central Government, state Government and private organizations like free ships, scholarships to the students, college taking efforts endlessly. This practice gives an opportunity to these socio economically backward students to pursue their higher education which lead to their development and upliftment of family.

Another important aspect of the institute’s distinctiveness is its support for sports and cultural activities. The institute recognizes that students need platform to develop their physical, social and cultural skills. Institute provides a range of sports facilities and opportunities for students to participate in various sports and cultural events. Though our students belong to rural area, endless efforts of college staff and Students College has won “Zonal General Championship” of youth festival continuously three years organized by University of Mumbai. Our students are showing brightness in many sports events organized by University of Mumbai. Our students vision many medals in sport events. We also motivate students to participate in “Avishkar Research Convention”.

The institute also recognizes the importance of social skills. To this end the institute has implemented various extension activities that aim to inculcate social skills in students. These activities include

community service projects, social awareness campaign etc. Through these activities students learn the value of giving back to society, develop empathy and compassion for others and gain a deeper understanding of the social issues facing their community.

The extension activities at the institute are carefully designed to provide students with meaningful experiences that allow them to apply what they have learned in the classroom to real world situation. Physical Development:

The institute promotes physical activities among the students to cultivate many important skills such as team spirit, confidence, decision making, mental strength etc. of the students. Each year, the institute organizes annual sports events comprising of various sports. In these sports boys and girls participate and show their skills, sportsman spirit, and team building abilities. During camps held at Mani- Bhute village adopted by the institute through NSS various physical activities like Yoga exercise, outdoor sports etc. are conducted.

Emotional Development:

Emotional intelligence of the students is given rapt attention at the institute. In mentor mentee system, mentor meets mentee as per the requirement.
